5K Trees in 5 Years

City of Lake Oswego's City Council has recently passed a Climate Action Plan that focuses on addressing climate change issues and part of that plan is with the Oswego Lake Watershed Council. The plan is to implement tree plantings and ivy removal from 5,000 trees in 5 years throughout our watershed with the help of our neighbors within Lake Oswego. We're taking this on to address serious issues with green house gas emissions, stormwater concerns, increasing native plant diversity, decrease erosion/ stream temperatures, foster community stewardship and engagement, and showcase Lake Oswego as a pioneer to addressing climate issue! The Oswego Lake Watershed Council has Park Academy learning pollinators! This season is swarming with various pollinator species - bees, wasps, beetles, spiders, birds, true bugs, and flies. Oswego Lake WC is currently teaching the students the art of ID between the various types and creating pollinator poles, or mason bee hotels to assist with nesting. Next time your near Park Academy check out the long 4x4x8 poles in the front and see who's inside! Our current Habitat Enhancement Fund grant from the City of Lake Oswego makes this possible!



Mountain Park HOA - Currently the watershed council and Mountain Park are working together to address fundamental erosion problems associated with a culvert along a pedestrian trail downhill from Mountain Park Church. Together the watershed council and Mountain Park are removing the old culvert under the pedestrian path and are creating a channel spanning bridge to put in its place. This will greatly increase the functionality of the stream to behave and flow normally during various storm events! With funds from the Oregon Watershed Enhancement Board, this project is set to be a success!
